Alex Music Awarded 2025 AAAS Mass Media Science & Engineering Fellowship



UGA Atmospheric Sciences graduate student Alex Music was recently named a recipient of the 2025 American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) Mass Media Science & Engineering Fellowship. According to the AAAS website, "This 10-week summer program places science, engineering, and mathematics students at media organizations nationwide. Fellows use their academic training as they research, write, and report today's headlines, sharpening their abilities to communicate complex scientific issues to the public.

This highly competitive program strengthens the connections between scientists and journalists by placing advanced undergraduate, graduate, and post-graduate level scientists, engineers, and mathematicians at media organizations nationwide. Fellows work as journalists at media organizations such as National Public Radio, Los Angeles Times, WIRED, Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, and NOVA. The Mass Media Fellows use their academic training in the sciences as they research, write and report today's headlines, sharpening their abilities to communicate complex scientific issues to non-specialists. Participants come in knowing the importance of translating their work for the public, but they leave with the tools and the know-how to accomplish this important goal.

For 10 weeks during the summer, the AAAS Mass Media Science & Engineering Fellows collaborate with media professionals at radio and television stations, newspapers, and magazines. As part of their job, the scientists and their journalist-hosts strive to make science news easy for the public to understand. The program strives to improve public understanding of science by enhancing coverage of science-related issues in the media. By embedding science students and recent grads in media outlets, the Fellows learn how to communicate scientific topics in clear and engaging ways, better understand how science is covered in the media, and build up a professional network of scientists and journalists who can work together to share science effectively. In its 50-year history, the program has supported nearly 900 fellows." **Congratulations, Alex!**



<u>Georgia Rotary Student Program (GRSP) Scholarship</u>

the Georgia Rotary Student Program (GRSP) and Rotary Clubs of Elberton, Hartwell and Madison County are offering one \$12,000 scholarship for an international student at the University of Georgia. The GRSP Direct College Selection Scholarship application for the Fall 2025 - Spring 2026 academic year.

- Award amount: \$12,000.00 total
 - This is a one-year non-renewable scholarship that pays \$6,000 for Fall Semester (2025) and \$6,000 for Spring Semester (2026) from GRSP. One scholarships will be offered.
- Available to a current or new undergraduate international applicants to the University of Georgia.
- Awardee will benefit from unique mentoring and networking provided by the Rotary Clubs.
- In addition, you will be assigned a Rotary "host family" for the full year and make a
 commitment to participate in this aspect of GRSP. The host families serve as your
 family away from home and help connect you to Rotary. You will also visit the homes of
 Rotarians when campus is closed, over school breaks or at other traditional times as
 well as for student weekend events. It is an immersive life-changing experience that
 allows both the student and family to learn about each other's experiences, cultures,
 and customs.
- Awardee must be available August 15-17, 2025 for GRSP orientation, plus participate in six GRSP student weekends and District Conference. Rotary will provide transportation to all student events.
- Awardee will be required to make one presentation in Fall Semester and one in Spring Semester to each sponsoring Rotary Club
- Additional funds (from the student or other scholarships) would be required for costs over and above the scholarship amount

The Application will open Thursday, March 20 The deadline is 5 p.m. on Monday, May 5.

- BEFORE APPLYING, BE AWARE: the application CANNOT be saved to continue later. We suggest you print it out, gather all supporting documentation, and finalize your short answer replies separately. Then, when ready, copy and paste your answers into the application. You will need to have the contact information for a reference as well as a digital photo of yourself.
- This is an individual application for Georgia Rotary Student Program, so College staff cannot assist you with your application. A letter of recommendation is required. Letters can be sent directly to GRSP email, as noted on application.

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- What happens next?
- You will receive a confirmation email that your application has been received.
- The Rotary Club(s) may request an interview to better assess your candidacy.
- If offered the scholarship, you will be notified by email.
- By May 31, 2025, you will be notified if you have received a scholarship or not.
- If offered a scholarship and agreeing to the scholarship terms, you will be contacted by the local host family paired with you by GRSP.
- Scholarship funds are sent directly to the institution, not the awardee, and applied to the student's account at the college/university in two payments in Fall and Spring semester.

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

 aids the local community as its serves to hone creative skills of young children.

<u>Community Mapping Seeking Undergraduates Research Assistants</u>

The Community Mapping Lab is looking for 2-3 undergraduates who would like to work as research assistants in Fall 2025. CML is currently involved in multiple ongoing projects, and so your work could include the following:

- Brooklyn Cemetery: Doing work documenting families and other notable individuals buried in this historically Black cemetery
- Reese Street storymapping: Continuing archival work developing online guides to the Reese Street neighborhood, a once thriving Black neighborhood just to the west of downtown. This may involve some oral history/interviewing as well as archival work
- Mapping the R-51 urban renewal project: Contributing to an ongoing effort to digitize and analyze records from the R-51 urban renewal project in Athens, which included the section of College St. just north of downtown
- Developing the CML archive: We are trying to create an online archive of materials the lab has created over the year. You would help get that running and start adding materials to it.

Most of this work requires some past experience with GIS and/or ESRI storymaps. But qualitative research skills are also relevant.

Research assistants in CML can get course credit by taking Geog4960R. You can also apply for CURO funding for the fall, which includes a \$1,000 stipend. Past students have generally been successful applying for CURO funding.
