• Paid Summer Research Opportunity

The project will provide climate risk information to underserved Georgia communities and offer guidance and resources for planning decisions to enhance climate resilience. Over the summer, we will conduct a case study working with municipal planners and environmental justice leaders in Augusta (and perhaps one more location) to initiate the process of building climate resilience and trust-based partnerships at the local level.

The student would primarily work with Dr. Yager in Marine Sciences and Dr. Harper in Geography to analyze county-level climate data from the Fifth National Climate Assessment (https://atlas.globalchange.gov/). This part-time, paid position starts on or after May 13 and lasts for approximately 2 months. Experience with GIS software, R, or Python is essential. We seek a motivated individual who has the potential to work independently to analyze and visualize the data, and who can attend project meetings and share their findings. 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StoryMapping Queer Climate Justice

Undergraduate research opportunity to work on a Community Geography project with the Astraea Foundation, an LGBTQ+ philanthropy non-profit, to create a "StoryMap" of the first cohort of their Queer Climate Justice grant fund. This includes working collaboratively with grantees to craft a visual narrative representing their work and then using the tools of ArcGIS online to "put it on the map" alongside climate vulnerability indicators. The project aims to help Astraea raise additional funds for this program and uplift the climate experiences of LGBTQ+ people and uplift their leadership in climate justice.

\$500 stipend for 30 hours of work over the summer semester. Flexible schedule.

• Shell to Shore's Birkley Heynen Internship Program

<u>Shell to Shore</u> is an oyster recycling program based in Athens. They are transporting discarded oyster shells from inland tables to the shore. Their goal is to connect this natural resource to restoration projects on the Georgia coast. First, they are diverting shells from the landfill. Then, they cure the shell in Athens. Last, they are transporting the shell to the shore at Sapelo Island to be used in efforts to build coastal resilience in partnership with folks at <u>Save Our Legacy Ourself (S.O.L.O.)</u> on Sapelo Island.

The main responsibilities during the internship include assisting with collecting oyster shells from restaurants weekly in Athens, Augusta and Atlanta as well as helping expand the network of restaurants they work with. Additionally, interns will learn about oyster culture, help expand educational capacity as well as assist finding new sources of funding to expand the project among other opportunities. Financial support for these internships has been made available by <u>UGA's Office of Sustainability</u>, <u>UGA's Willson Center</u>, <u>UGA's Odum School</u> of Ecologyand The Birkley Heynen Environmental Foundation.

Human Geography Lecturer at UNT

The Department of Geography and the Environment at the University of North Texas (UNT) is seeking a lecturer with expertise in human geography starting Fall 2024 for a two-year appointment with the possibility of renewal. We seek candidates who have an MS or PhD in geography, or an advanced degree in a related field. Candidates should show evidence of successful teaching in areas of human geography and geographic techniques, such as Global Societies (or World Regional Geography), one or more specialties (such as political, urban, medical, economic, resource, sustainability, or another area of human geography), and one or more technical courses (such as Introduction to GIS, Quantitative Methods, Qualitative Methods, Field Methods, or another techniques course). The successful applicant should be able to teach introductory human geography courses using engaging pedagogy. The teaching load will be 3 to 4 courses per semester.
